



### Spontaneous Regression of Myopic Schisis

A 51-year-old man with high myopia presented with outer maculoschisis in the right eye after OCT scan (A). Adherence of the hyaloid was noticed during fundusoscopic exploration. Opting for a conservative approach, subsequent annual follow-ups revealed a partial vitreous detachment, leading to progressive macular structural recovery (B–D), with best-corrected visual acuity (BCVA) improving from 8/20 to 20/20 after 3 years. Tight vitreomacular attachment is responsible for gradual worsening of schisis in myopic patients. The attenuation of these forces, due to partial vitreous detachment, may explain this infrequent case of spontaneous regression.
